

Christ Church provided the perfect setting for another moving Memorial Service. What an honor to remember those who passed in the same church in which many of our founding fathers worshipped. A bagpiper welcomed us as we arrived, the church organist played the National Anthem, and a bugler played Taps from the balcony. It couldn't have been more beautiful.

Proclamation

Our nation's military has an illustrious history in the City of Philadelphia, with the founding of the US Army, Navy, and Marine Corps here. Multiple generations of brave and heroic men and women from our city and region have proudly served in the US military. These individuals wanted to do their part to uphold the principles of freedom and democracy that are the legacy of our City. We are all indebted to those who risked their lives for their nation, and those who made the ultimate sacrifice will always be honored and remembered.

The Sixth Marine Division, which fought in the Battle of Okinawa — a pivotal military campaign that was essential to our nation's victory in World War II — is one such group of distinguished American military heroes. During the bloodiest battle that occurred in the Pacific, an estimated 240,000 American and Japanese soldiers and civilians lost their lives over 82 days. Within the Sixth Division, over 2,000 Marines were killed but the Marines were successful in taking two-thirds of the island. It would be the last major battle of World War II.

The Division was formed in September 1944 following the Battle of Guam as the men of the 4th and 22nd Marine Regiments and supporting troops formed the new outfit. Their incredible heroism and sacrifice are an inspiration to generations of Americans and future military personnel. The City of Philadelphia humbly recognizes these heroic members of what has been defined as the "Greatest Generation" who fought for the soul of our country and the world.

Between Tuesday, August 27 and Sunday, September 1, 2019, the City of Philadelphia is deeply honored to host the 49th annual reunion of this distinguished group of military veterans. For nearly half a century, the men of the Sixth Division and their families have come together for an annual reunion. This year, eight veterans between the ages of 93 and 98 are expected to attend a week of festivities in our City, which will include a ceremony on the Battleship New Jersey and visits to the National Constitution Center, Museum of the American Revolution, and Independence Hall. Author Buzz Bissinger, son of Sixth Division veteran Gerry Bissinger, and his wife Lisa Smith are serving as reunion hosts, and Mr. Bissinger is currently writing a book about the men of this Division, their service to their country, and the loss of our greatest generation.

THEREFORE...

I, James F. Kenney, Mayor of the City of Philadelphia, do hereby proclaim the week of Tuesday, August 27 to Sunday, September 1, 2019 to be the

We have just published a book by George F. Conley, Jr., who was in the 6th Marine Division, 29th Regiment and landed in Okinawa on April 1, 1945. The book is a museum-quality work of art that took nine years to complete and contains 1,234 images drawn by the author.

The book was created because George dedicated his life to studying the beauties of the natural world to honor the life of his buddy, John Coulon Walsh, who lost his life on Okinawa on May 14, 1945.

History of the Marine Corps Ball

The annual Marine Corps Birthday Ball is a celebration of Marine Corps history and traditions. It represents where the Marine Corps started and where it is now while giving us a glimpse of the past, present and future. Throughout the world on 10 November, Marines celebrate the birth of their Corps — the most loyal, feared, revered, and professional fighting force the world has ever known. unveiled a memorial plaque at Tun Tavern, the birthplace of the Marine Corps. Then the entourage headed for the Benjamin Franklin Hotel for an evening of celebration.

Over the years the annual Birthday Ball grew, taking on a life of its own. In 1952, Commandant General Lemuel C. Shepherd Jr. formalized the cakecutting ceremony and other traditional observanc-

In 1921, the 13th Commandant, General John A. Lejeune, issued Marine Corps Order No. 47, Series 1921. General Lejeune's order summarized the history, mission, and tradition of the Corps. It further directed



ditional observances. The birthday cake is traditionally cut with a sword. The first three pieces of cake are given to the Guest of Honor, the oldest Marine present, and the youngest Marine present. Another tradition is the reading of General Lejeune's order and the cur-

that the order be read to all Marines each year on 10 November to honor the founding of the Marine Corps.

Soon after, Marine commands began to not only honor the birthday, but to celebrate it. In 1923, the Marine Barracks at Ft. Mifflin, PA staged a formal dance. The Marines at the Washington Navy Yard arranged a mock battle on the parade ground. At Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, the Marine baseball team played a Cuban team and won with a score of 9 to 8, but this was only the beginning.

The first "formal" Birthday Ball took place in Philadelphia in 1925. Guests included the Commandant, the Secretary of War (known today as the Secretary of Defense), and a host of statesmen and elected officials. Prior to the Ball, General Lejeune rent Commandant's birthday message to the Corps.

Like the U.S. Marine Corps itself, the annual Birthday Ball has evolved from modest origins to the dignified function it is today.

On 10 November, regardless of where Marines are stationed or deployed, you will always hear "Happy Birthday, Marine."

Former Newsletter Editor, Joe Singleton, Now Reporting from Heaven



It is with great sadness that I learned Joe Singleton passed away on October 5, 2019 in Nevada in the company of his four children and other loved ones. It was three months after he celebrated his 94th birthday.

As many of you know, Joe was the editor of the Striking Sixth for more than a decade ending in 2012. That's when I took over the newsletter. Unlike Joe, who was a professional journalist, I had no idea what I was doing. I read through several past newsletters to get an idea of what the Striking Sixth was all about, and then I began firing emails to Joe. They were full of questions. I was so annoving, I thought loe might volunteer to take back the newsletter rather than have to deal with my never-ending questions. But that's not Joe. He patiently answered every single query and gave me all the information I needed to get that first newsletter out the door. He was equally helpful when he, Connie and I decided to resurrect the website. What vision he had!

Joe was bright and witty, and boy could he write. Here's something he wrote for the website a few years ago:



"There are not many of us left at this writing in 2016, but we remember. It was one hell of a time. It is 70 years later, but we hope you find it interesting. It certainly was interesting to us back then."

Joe was interested in everything it seemed. That probably explains why he was such a good journalist. It certainly made him a great conversationalist. He had a lot of experiences to draw on, having lived all over the country, fought in World War II and Korea, attended the Universities of Texas and Denver, and had numerous jobs. Everyone loved to talk to him. According to his son,

"Near the end, his rooms at the hospital, acute care and hospice facilities were crowded with his children, their/his friends, and the nurses, CNAs and practitioners who would always linger well beyond their work to talk with him because he always greeted them with a smile, politeness and good conversation."



From the Historian's Corner

FREDERICKSBURG, VIRGINIA, PART ONE

Fredericksburg was established by an act of the Virginia General Assembly in 1728 on land that was originally patented in 1681. It is surrounded by Stafford and Spotsylvania counties. It sits along the Rappahannock River, right at Virginia's fall line, which exists between the Appalachian piedmont and the Atlantic coastal plain. This fall line made Fredericksburg a major commercial and trading area. Farmers from the "frontier" of central Virginia sent their trade goods to Fredericksburg by wagon. When they reached Fredericksburg, the goods could be stored in the city's many warehouses or loaded onto ships that sailed down the deep and placid Rappahannock to the ocean and on to England.

At the time of Fredericksburg's founding, the plantation economy was moving out of Tidewater Virginia and further west, and tobacco exports were growing rapidly. Fredericksburg was ideally located for tobacco shipments, and the city became a burgeoning commercial center with a thriving port. (I tell my students that Fredericksburg was the New World's New York at this time.) Merchants and a middle class evolved to support the shipping commerce.

Fredericksburg also developed culturally and politically. The city served as a meeting ground for patriots during the period of growing unrest that led up to the American Revolution. A draft of resolutions for declaring independence from Britain was drawn up at the Rising Sun Tavern, one Fredericksburg's earliest inns. Many of the men from this area became Revolutionary War heroes and founding fathers of the new nation, including James Monroe and George Washington. George's mother, Mary Washington, also lived in the area. (Today the University of Mary Washington resides in Fredericksburg, and is the alma mater of this author)

After the war, in 1781, Fredericksburg was officially incorporated as a town within the new Commonwealth of Virginia, and its commerce continued to expand. The city was no longer dependent solely on tobacco, as settlers in Virginia's western counties discovered other crops that were profitable. Fredericksburg adapted to meet the needs of the new economy. For example, grist mills were built, and by 1816, 160,000 barrels of flour were milled in Fredericksburg.



In addition, domestic markets were growing, and finished products were shipped to American cities such as New York, Philadelphia and Baltimore, rather than solely to England.

In the late 1840's, Fredericksburg's fortunes changed as the railroad bypassed the city, and it became a sleepy backwater. However, its location fifty miles from both Washington DC and the Confederate capital of Richmond put it back in the limelight as the drums of the Civil War began to beat. That is the next part of the story, which will be featured in the spring Striking Sixth.
