I'm a Tough Old Geezer

When Japanese fighter pilots bombed Pearl Harbor 77 years ago today, Cairo's Bill Eblen was a "boneheaded" 16-year-old, he says, boasting with friends about how he would fend off the next attack with his rifle from home.

He enlisted in the Marine Corps two weeks after graduating high school, hoping for warm weather and tropical music in the South Pacific.

He had no idea what to expect, the 93-year-old told The Southern. But of all his options, he thought the Marines were the least likely to get him killed.

"You go over there a snotnosed kid," Eblen said, "lackadaisical as hell. You don't believe it until it happens. It's gutwrenching."

April 1, 1945, was his reality check. Eblen and his regiment were dropped into the water just off Okinawa to begin their advance. They scrambled to shore under the cover of American gunboat fire so intense the water "looked like it was boiling," Eblen said.

"I was scared to death," he said. "They probably thought I was shooting dice," by the way his hands were shaking.

Like many veterans of the world's bloodiest modern war, Eblen's deployment was a series of near-death experiences.

He was nearly killed in training off the island of Guadalcanal when a Japanese submarine ambushed his ship.

Months later, he narrowly avoided the Battle of Iwo Jima, which claimed over 26,000 American lives, and which Eblen firmly believes would have killed him, too. Eblen can laugh about those experiences now, but he knows they changed him.

He was shipped home from China holding the rank of corporal. But back on U.S. soil, he struggled to find a sense of a purpose.

"I was more interested in drinking than doing anything else," Eblen said. He had horrible nightmares and heard scream-

ing. He was easily startled, to the point he warned his young nieces and nephews not to scare him or catch him unawares.

"I could really hurt someone," he worried in those moments. "It was spontaneous."

Over 70 years later, the trauma still affects him some-

times, he said, when something startles him at the Anna Veterans Home where he lives.

In spite of the scars, Eblen is tremendously proud of his military service, as is his family.

"If we all sit down at the table, there's plenty of political differences, but you won't find anyone in our family that doesn't respect the military," said John Profilet, Eblen's brother-in-law.

Instead, he was assigned to the Battle of Okinawa. He spent 61 days on the front lines as a radio operator for the 29th Regiment of the 6th Marine Division, calling in airstrikes for other companies as they moved northward.

In that time he came feet away from being killed by a mortar strike, watched a kamikaze pilot dive towards U.S. boats, and called in air strikes on top of his own position, as he was pinned down by enemy fire.

Eblen married into Profilet's family, also of Cairo, in the 1960s, and found success as an insurance salesman and estate planner. He's an animal lover and a major financial supporter of PAWS, Anna's no-kill animal shelter. One day, he plans to be buried in his blues.

Eblen's first brush with fame came late in life, when he donned his marine dress uniform to attend his niece's 2017 wedding.

He was pushed down the aisle in a wheelchair, holding a sign that read "I'm her something blue," referring to the traditional wisdom that for good fortune a bride should carry, among other things, a blue object with her on her wedding day.

The photos received some 33 million hits on social media, his family said, and Eblen was interviewed by media outlets from across the country, including People magazine. Still, he promises the fame never went to his head. At least he's pretty sure it didn't.

"I'm too damn old to remember!" he said.

These days, Eblen's duty as a soldier is to keep spirits up at the Anna Veterans Home, he explained.

"I'm a big jokester, always have been," he said. "Just get 'em laughing. That's my niche in life, I guess." There are several other WWII vets at the home, Eblen said. But they're disappearing quickly.

"There's not many of us left to celebrate out here," Eblen said. "We'd like to, but they play taps here more than they do at Arlington National Cemetery. And I don't want to be in that line."

Among the vets, Eblen considers himself lucky to have a family that visits him, and a mind that's still good enough to recite the names and calibers of Japanese artillery from 70 years ago, and track all the players on the current Cardinals roster.

"Most of the guys in here who really got it the worst won't say anything," Eblen said. "They just clam up, they're still so shocked. They don't want to be brought back into that any more."

He's had roommates who barely spoke and others who screamed uncontrollably. Regardless, his approach is the same.

Talk to them. Cheer them up.

"He's a unique person at the veterans' home," Profilet said. "He livens up the guys. He's uplifting."

And still going strong. Aside from a bad back, which is "everyone's" problem, Eblen said he's feeling great and looking forward to his 94th birthday, four days after Christmas.

"I'm a tough old geezer," he said. "A blast from the past."

GETTING FROM THE AIRPORT TO THE HOTEL

The easiest option is to take a **taxi**. It should cost around \$30-35 before tip. The trip is 20 minutes *if* there's no traffic.

The cheapest option is the **SEPTA train**. It costs \$8.00 if you purchase your ticket from the conductor (cash only) or \$6.75 if purchased online or at the station ticket office. The trains leave every half hour between 5:00 am and midnight. The trip takes 25 minutes. Get off the train at the Jefferson Station (the 5th stop after the airport terminals). It's a short walk — two-tenths of a mile — to the Loews Philadelphia Hotel.

GETTING AROUND THE CITY

Don't waste your money on a rental car!

Many places are within walking distance of our hotel. For most everything else, try the **Philly Phlash**. It's an air-conditioned, wheelchairaccessible bus that travels a loop around the city every 15 minutes from 10:00 am - 6:00 pm. It's \$2.00 per ride, or \$5.00 for an all-day pass. Buy your tickets onboard (cash only). You can find the route map online, or pick up a map when you board the bus. It goes to all the major tourist attractions, including the ones mentioned in this newsletter.

And of course there's Uber, Lyft and taxis.

wednesday, august 28 Battleship New Jersey Museum and Barbecue Lunch

Here's your chance to tour a World War II battleship that played a key role in Sixth Marine Division history! The USS New Jersey, America's most decorated battleship, was directly engaged in the conquest of Okinawa from 14 March until 16 April 1945. As the carriers prepared for the invasion, she fought off air raids, rescued downed pilots, defended the carriers from suicide planes (shooting down at least three), and heavily bombarded the beaches in preparation for the invasion.

Built in the Philadelphia Naval Shipyard, the USS New Jersey was launched on December 7, 1942. After serving in the Pacific theatre during World War II, she saw action in Korea, Vietnam, Lebanon, and the Persian Gulf. She earned 19 battle stars, nine of them during World War II.

Decommissioned in 1991, the New Jersey returned to her birthplace in Philadelphia for restoration. In 2001, she opened as a museum just across the river from Philadelphia in Camden, NJ.

THURSDAY, AUGUST 29 Philadelphia City Tour, Independence Hall and Lunch at City Tavern

Calling all history geeks! Hop on the bus for a guided tour of Philadelphia where history is around every corner.

After seeing the city's top sights, we'll park the bus at Independence Hall where our nation was born. Nearly 250 years ago, 56 courageous men gathered here to sign the Declaration of Independence. Eleven years later in the same room, delegates to the Constitutional Convention created and signed the U.S. Constitution. We'll stand in that very room during a guided tour of the building!

Just across the street is the Liberty Bell, our next stop on the tour. Although the bell is cracked, it's message of liberty still rings out to all.

Our final stop is the City Tavern, housed in a replica of the historic 18th Century building that stood on the same site. Frequented by the Founding Fathers, the City Tavern was the site of the first anniversary celebration of Independence Day on July 4, 1777. John Adams called it "the most genteel tavern in America," and we know our group will be at their genteel best as they dine on authentic 18th Century fare. FRIDAY, AUGUST 30 National Constitution Center with Box Lunch

Celebrate the greatest vision of human freedom in history — the United States Constitution! Just a quick bus ride from our hotel, the National Constitution Center brings the Constitution to life through interactive exhibits, rare artifacts, films, and photographs.

We'll begin with *Freedom* Rising, a stirring multimedia production that takes you from 1787 to the present as a live actor narrates the American quest for freedom. Then you're free to walk around the center at your own pace.

From the Historian's Corner TUN TAVERN, BIRTHPLACE OF THE MARINE CORPS

Tun Tavern was built by Samuel Carpenter in 1685 as a "brew house." It was in Philadelphia on the corner of Water Street and Tun Alley, near the waterfront. At the time, tun meant a "cask" of beer, a barrel etc. Hence, Tun Tavern, which would go on to serve both not-sosavory characters and some of the greatest leaders in American history.

Although Tun Tavern no longer exists, there is a sign near its original location that honors its historical legacy. If one wants to experience a tavern of that time period, there are a number of taverns along the east coast that are similar in their construction. Yet none have the lineage of Tun Tavern.

George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, and many members of the Continental Congress all raised a pint and conducted business in Tun Tavern. In fact, it acquired the nickname "Governors Club." Ben Franklin used it as a meeting place for the Pennsylvania militia.

Tun Tavern quickly developed a reputation for serving fine beer. According to food lore, the first Philly Cheese Steak was served there. It also gained distinction as the birthplace of the first American Masonic Lodge. The St. John's Lodge No. 1 of the Grand Lodge of the Masonic

Temple held its meetings at the tavern, and Ben Franklin was the third Grand Master. In 1747, another organization was founded within its walls – the St. Andrews Society, a charitable group dedicated to assisting poor immigrants from Scotland.

However, the most notable birth of all was that of the Marine Corps on November 10, 1775. Yes, the Marine Corps was really founded in a tavern. Samuel Nichols, who had received his commission in the Continental service 18 days before (and is considered to be the first Commandant of the Marine Corps), was assigned the job of commissioning two battalions of Marines by the Continental Congress. He began the process in none other that Tun Tavern. He appointed then-proprietor Rob-(continued on next page)



ert Mullan to be his number one recruiter. Recruits were lured by the promise of a beer and the opportunity of a job.

Although they were unable to recruit a full two battalions, the Marines served admirably throughout the Revolutionary War. Following the war, they were put on moth balls for a while because their services were seen as unneeded. They did, of course, rise again and become part of the American story. That story began with the Corps' noble birth at Tun Tavern, and it has been carried down throughout its history. It is a story that Marines everywhere are honored to tell.



Elfreth's Alley




Step back into history with a walk down America's oldest continuously inhabited street. Thirtytwo houses line the narrow cobblestone street.
